Preface

The National Programme of Nutritional Support for Primary Education—NPNSPE i.e. National Mid Day Meal Scheme was initiated by India in the year1995. The programme was launched with a view to enhancing enrollment, retention and attendance and simultaneously improving Nutritional levels among children and to have an important social values and foster equality as children learn to sit together and share a common meal. One can expect some erosion of caste prejudices and class inequality. The real success of MDM rests on the process of effective supervision and monitoring through community participation.

Mid-day Meal in Uttar Pradesh is implemented with the joint efforts of the Government of India and state government. The present Mid-day Meal Programme covers all the primary and upper primary schools of the state. The Giri Institute of Development Studies, Lucknow was commissioned by MDM Authority, Uttar Pradesh for conducting Pilot Social Audit of MDM Scheme in the Barabanki and Shrawasti districts of Uttar Pradesh.

The Pilot Social Audit was conducted during August to September 2015. The Social Audit covered 40 sample primary and upper primary schools of Barabanki and Shrawasti, districts of Uttar Pradesh, these low performance districts were suggested by the, Government of Uttar Pradesh. The Institute has prepared the present report of Pilot Social Audit of MDMS Barabanki and Shrawasti districts of Uttar Pradesh.

We are thankful to Director, MDM Authority, Uttar Pradesh, Ms. Shradha Mishra, IAS, for her cooperation and support for undertaking the Social Audit. We also express our deep sense of gratitude to Shri S.P. 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Chapter I

Introduction

1.1 Mid-Day Meal Programme:

Mid-day Meal is implemented as a joint effort of the Government of India and the State Government of Uttar Pradesh. The Government of India implemented this scheme from 15 August, 1995. Under the scheme, students from government- and state-aided Primary Schools, from classes 1-5, who had minimum 80 percent attendance, were provided 3 kg of wheat or rice per month. However, it was observed that the benefits of the scheme did not completely go to the students and the grains were distributed among their family members.

Therefore, to make the scheme student-focused, the Supreme Court, in 2004, directed to implement the Mid-day Meal Programme in the form of 'cooked meal' in Primary Schools. Subsequently, keeping in view the success of the programme, mid-day meal scheme is also being implemented in the Middle schools in the educationally backward blocks since October, 2007. The programme has been further extended to cover all blocks and middle school in urban areas too.

The present Mid-day Meal Programme covers all the primary and middle schools of the State. The State Government has constituted a Mid-day Meal Authority since October, 2006 for the effective implementation of the Programme. Under the scheme, boys and girls are provided tasty, cooked food during the daily school interval. The provision is to provide food made of rice during four days and food made of wheat during two days in a week. The Government of India provides hundred grams (100 gms) per student per day (Wheat/Rice) for primary classes and one hundred fifty grams (150 gms) per student per day in middle classes. The provision is for the conversation cost from food grains to cooked food. The government provides Rs. 3.86 per student per day for Primary Schools and Rs. 5.78 per student per day in Middle schools in the form of conversation cost and for the arrangement of other materials. The Food Corporation of India ensures the availability of food grains. Voluntary Agencies have also been involved in the preparation of food in urban area. The government has set the menu and provision has been made for a separate kitchen on the school premises. Strict monitoring and



inspection mechanisms have been involved for the desired and effective implementation of the scheme.

1.2 Objectives of MDM Programme:

Major objectives of the Mid Day Meal Scheme are:

- To make available nutritious food to children enrolled in Classes 1-8 in schools (Govt, Local Body, Govt Aided schools, Govt Aided Maqtab & Madarsa, AIE centers and NCLP schools).
- To develop the grasping power of children by improving their nutrition level.
- To enhance the enrollment of children in schools.
- To develop a tendency in the children to stay in school, especially during schoolinterval, and to reduce the drop-out rate.
- To foster the feeling of brotherhood and to develop positive outlook through coeating and combined food preparation for the children belonging to different religions and castes and socio-economic backgrounds.

1.4 Basis of Social Audit:

Social audit as a term was used in 1950s. There has been a flurry of activity and interest in the last seven to eight years in India and neighbouring countries. Voluntary development organizations are also actively concerned.

Social audit is based on the principle that democratic local governance should be carried out, as far as possible, with the consent and understanding of all concerned. It is thus a process and not an event.

1.5 What is a Social Audit?

A social audit is a way of measuring, understanding, reporting and ultimately improving an organization's social and ethical performance. A social audit helps to narrow gaps between vision/goal and reality, between efficiency and effectiveness. It is a technique to understand, measure, verify, report on and to improve the social performance of the organization.

Social auditing creates an impact upon governance. It values the voice of stakeholders, including marginalized/poor groups whose voices are rarely heard. Social auditing is taken up for the purpose of enhancing local governance, particularly for strengthening accountability and transparency in local bodies.

The key difference between development and social audit is that a social audit focuses on the neglected issue of social impacts, while a development audit has a broader focus including environment and economic issues, such as the efficiency of a project or programme.

1.6 Objectives of Social Audit:

- 1. Assessing the physical and financial gaps between needs and resources available for local development.
- 2. Creating awareness among beneficiaries and providers of local social and productive services.
- 3. Increasing efficacy and effectiveness of local development programmes.



- 4. Scrutiny of various policy decisions, keeping in view stakeholder interests and priorities, particularly for rural poor.
- 5. Estimation of the opportunity cost for stakeholders who are not getting timely access to public services.

1.7 Advantages of Social Audit:

- (a) Trains the community on participatory local planning;
- (b) Encourages local democracy;
- (c) Encourages community participation.;
- (d) Benefits disadvantaged groups;
- (e) Promotes collective decision making and sharing responsibilities;
- (f) Develops human resources and social capital

To be effective, the social auditor must have the right to:

- 1. Seek clarifications from the implementing agency about any decision-making, activity, scheme, income and expenditure incurred by the agency;
- 2. Consider and scrutinize existing schemes and local activities of the agency; and
- 3. Access registers and documents relating to all development activities undertaken by the implementing agency or by any other government department.

This requires transparency in the decision-making and activities of the implementing agencies. In a way, social audit includes measures for enhancing transparency by enforcing the right to information in the planning and implementation of local development activities.

1.8 Public Hearing:

The main purpose of public meeting is to obtain public testimony or comment. The key finding of the audit is discussed in the public meeting and the concerned government officials will respond to the key issues raised in such a meeting. A public meeting for social audit is a special meeting for a specific purpose, with no other matters addressed other than a particular issue of focus.

Public Hearing is a formal meeting conducted at the community level. Such meeting gives an ample opportunity for the officials of the concerned organizations and



general public to come together to exchange the information and experiences about the community level development work. Such meeting is opened to all community people to participate. Public Hearing gives the platform for the common people to express their views, concerns and complaints in front of people's representative or officials. In addition, it is an opportunity to assess the quality of services, effectiveness, relevance through the eyes of beneficiaries and target people. On the other hand, it is the opportunity for the officials and agencies to understand the experiences, satisfactions and view points of the beneficiaries about the services. Public Hearing is an important method to make Local Self-governance system for ensuring transparency, responsive, people's participation and accountability towards local people. Public Hearing is a direct and open interaction process among the concerned stakeholders on public concerns and issues in a common forum. Public Hearing is 'a direct interaction process where the citizen can directly put on questions to the concerned officials and to find out the legal way for solving problem ' (Care 2005:10). Public Hearing And Social Audit gives an opportunity to citizens and users to reach out the officials, put on their concerns and reactions, suggest way out and remedial options. Public Hearing is contextually known as Citizen Hearing or Community Hearing, Citizen Court or Community Court. In any name called upon, Public Hearing is an open discourse to find out the positive and negative aspects and system of drawing appropriate conclusion.

1.9 Activities Involved:

The following activities were undertaken under the Pilot Social Audit of Mid Day Meal Scheme;

- Setting up of Social Audit Coordination & Facilitation Unit (SACFU).
- Three days training programme held for Social Audit Facilitators (SACFU) in the institute.
- Two sets of Schedules are prepared, one for primary data collections from the schools regarding all interventions of MDM Scheme including financial and physical targets and achievements including detailed interviews of parents, SMCs members, children, cooks, teachers for investigation of quality, quantity, menu, in MDM regularity, participation / cooperation of SMCs member, community and



problems in the schools during serving the food to the students. Secondary data collections from BSA office of selected districts.

- The Key Points/Check List also prepared for conducting the Focus Group Discussions (FGDs) with parents, children, community members and SMCs etc. There was used during the school audit being audited regarding proper implementation of MDM Scheme and role and discussed duties of stakeholder etc.
- A briefing meeting was held on 24.07.2015 with the officials of State Government, MDM Authority and all concerned stakeholders including BSAs of Shrawasti and Barabanki districts. In this meeting the preparation of Pilot Social Audit and selection of blocks, schools including required district level information etc. also discussed.
- Twenty schools were selected randomly for Social Audit in each of the two poor performing districts, Shrawasti and Barabanki.
- Briefing meetings were also held at BRCs in each sample block with the B.E.Os, ABRCs and all concerned Head Teachers including NPRCs of Shrawasti and Barabanki districts. In this meeting the preparation and strategies of Pilot Social Audit, location and type of schools including required information etc. were also discussed.
- Awareness campaign was launched about the Social Audit on MDM Scheme through local media, wall writings and stakeholders of the villages and education department.
- The Social Auditors were identified by the resource persons from the parents of students studying in the schools and members of the SMCs who were willing for training and actively participating in the Social Audit process.
- One day training programme was organized in each of selected blocks by the SACFU for parents of the students residing in the panchayats, SMCs members and active educated youths at the local level.



- Verification of educational and MDM related infrastructures facilities including status of manpower, atmosphere, hygiene and health checkup of students etc. was undertaken at the schools level.
- Verification of MDM related all records at school level was undertaken which included SMCs meeting, food grain supply, income and expenditures of cooking cost, payment of honorarium to Cook-cum-helper and monitoring & supervision of the scheme.
- Focus Group Discussions (FGDs) were held with parents, children, community members and SMCs etc during the school audit regarding proper implementation of MDM Scheme and role and duties of stakeholder etc.
- The school level meetings were organized with the parents and the implementing agency (PDS agents, suppliers of food grains, panchyat representatives, CCHs, etc). The views of the students and parents were also solicited and recorded regarding various aspects of MDMS.
- School level meetings were held to read out the finding of the Social Audit.
- Public Hearings were conducted which were open to all at the Block level as a culmination of the social audit process, followed by school level meeting. In the public hearings, the school- wise social audit findings were read out in the presence of responsible educational officials for taking up action to rectify a gap or laps in the proper implementation of MDM Scheme.

1.10 Sample Size:

For taking up social audit exercise, 20 schools were covered in each of sample districts. Out of 20 schools, 10 have been selected from each of the two selected blocks per district. In each of the selected blocks, 10 schools (6 primary and 4 upper primary) belonging to different gram panchyats were selected randomly. Thus, total 40 sample schools were selected for pilot social audit of MDM scheme as under:

1.11 Details of Training Programmes Organized for Selected Social Auditors:

For selecting the active social auditors to organize the social audits of MDM scheme in the sample schools, awareness campaigns were launched in the selected gram panchayats. Under this process the active social auditors were identified. Two or three social auditors were identified from each of the selected gram panchyat by the resource persons with the help of local educational officials and panchayats representatives from the parents of students studying in the schools and members of the SMCs who were willing for training and actively participating in the social audit process. One day training programme was organized in each of selected blocks by the resource persons. Details about the training programmes are given in following Table-1.2.

Chapter II

Management of Districts for MDM Scheme

2.1 Total Numbers of Schools:

Social Audit on Mid Day Meal scheme was conducted in Barabanki and Shrawasti districts of Uttar Pradesh. There are 3105 elementary schools in Barabanki district, including 2193 Primary Schools and 912 Upper Primary Schools. Along with this, there are 888 Primary Schools and 407 Upper Primary Schools, a sum of 1295 elementary schools in Shrawasti district (Table: 2.1).

2.2 Total Students Enrolled:

As apparent from table: 2.2, in Barabanki district there are 252252 (74.79 percent) students enrolled in primary schools out of which there are 124663 boys (49.42 percent) and 127589 girls (50.58 percent). While on the other hand, upper primary schools have a total of 85010(25.21 percent) students enrolled which comprising about 47 percent boys and about 53 percent girls in the same district. Total number of students enrolled in elementary schools of Shrawasti district is 141699. There are 58024 boys (52.01percent) and 53536 girls (47.99 percent) in primary schools and 49.10 percent boys and 50.90 percent girls in upper primary schools.

2.3 Numbers of Schools where Kitchen shed is unavailable:

Table 2.3 illustrates facts of unavailability of kitchen shed. In Barabanki district 3 primary schools and 3 upper primary schools have not kitchen sheds. Whereas, in Shrawasti district all primary schools have kitchen sheds and about 4 percent upper primary schools have not kitchen sheds. Lack of space and funds were the reasons given by concerned authorities for unavailability of kitchen sheds in these schools.

2.4 Cook- Cum Helpers:

As information provided by office of the BSA Barabanki and Shrawasti districts, Primary schools of Barabanki district had 5659 (71.87 percent) cook- cum helpers, while upper primary schools had only 28.13 percent cook- cum helpers. Shrawasti district accounted for 73.18 percent cook- cum helpers in primary schools and only 26.82 percent in upper primary schools. Majority of the cook- cum helpers in Shrawasti district were female i.e. 97.84 percent, gender wise data is unavailable in district Barabanki as apparent from table 2.4.

2.5 Social- Category of Cook- Cum Helpers:

Table: 2.5 shows that majority of cook- cum helpers are belonging to OBC in both districts. The total number of SC is 1353 and 6521 OBC including general and



minorities' cook- cum helpers in elementary schools of Barabanki district. This includes 1003 SC and 4656 OBC in primary and 350 SC and 1865 OBC cook- cum helpers in upper primary schools. In Shrawasti district the number of cook- cum helpers belongs to SC 310, OBC 1541, minority 37 and general caste 562 in primary schools. In upper primary schools there are 269 SC, 329 OBC, 14 minorities and 286 cooks- cum helpers belonging to general caste.

2.6 Imparted Training about MDM Scheme:

It is clear from table: 2.6 that in both districts neither training nor modules were provided to the CCHs, Teachers and Gram Pradhans about the MDM Scheme. It is also reported that there is no health check-up of cook- cum helpers was done nor any month is decided to celebrate MDM scheme in both of the districts as well. In none of the schools MDM is provided through centralized kitchen or any institution nominated for purchasing of cooking material.

2.7 Implementation, Inspection& Monitoring of MDM Scheme:

In both districts regular inspection by officials is done for efficient execution of MDM Scheme at district level. Appointment of District Coordinator (MDM) at district level is done and district level officials prepared schedules for inspection. At the time of Social Audit the officials had inspected 84 percent schools in Barabanki district and 100 percent schools in Shrawasti district. Inspection reports were discussed in the meeting of steering cum monitoring committee and action was also taken on these reports in both districts (Table: 2.7).

2.8 Awareness of MDM Scheme:

In Barabanki district the community is made aware about MDM Scheme throughtelevision, radio and print —media whereas only through print media in Shrawasti district films on MDM Scheme (prepared by Government of India), are not shown to people in any of the district. Regular monthly meetings of district level taskforce are organized in chairmanship of District Magistrate in both districts. District authority of MDM scheme



informed that contact numbers of fire fighting system and medical officers are displayed and first aid box is also available in every school of Barabanki district. On the other hand in Shrawasti district, fire fighting system is available and contact numbers of district level officials and ambulance (108 &102) are displayed at every school.

2.11 Received and Expenditure:

Table: 2.11, shows the amount received and expenditure under different category. In Barabanki district 16.02 lakhs was received as honorarium of CCHs and 219.44 lakhs as conversion cost. All the money was spent on both heads with nil balance. In Shrawasti district received 66.96 lakhs as honorarium of CCHs and 125.01 lakhs as conversion cost. Out of this nothing was spent as honorarium of CCHs whereas 60.60 lakhs (48.48 percent) were spent as conversion cost with a balance of 51.52 percent amount (64.40 lakhs).

2.12 Food Grains Received and Utilized:

Table 2.12 illustrates the detail of received food grains and their utilization in both districts. 3420.38 quintal of wheat and 6946.56 quintal of rice have received in Barabanki district. All received food grains were consumed with nil balance. While 1857.410 quintal wheat and 3774.90 quintal rice received in Shrawasti district. Out of these 572.140 quintal (30.80 percent) of wheat and 1144.280 quintal (30.31 percent) of rice was consumed with about 69 percent of both the cereals left behind as balance.

Chapter III

Regularity, Quality and Infrastructural Facilities of MDM

3.1 Availability of Food Grains:

Table 3.1 shows that only in 26 schools, out of 40, food grains were available for one month. During the Social Audit, it was found that 80 percent of Barabanki and 75 percent of Shrawasti districts the food grains delivered to schools by the PDS agent. It is observed that good quality of food grains is available in 70 percent schools of Barabanki and 85 percent schools of Shrawasti District. The list of sample schools where non -availability of food grains in the schools is given in Annexure 1 (a) and 1 (b).

3.2 Food Grains Accessed by:

During the social audit it was reported by the head teachers of 4 sample schools of Barabanki district and 5 schools of Shrawasti district that food grains was not accessed by PDS agents at schools level. It was observed that food grains were not directly accessed by PDS agents in the schools. The food grains were taken from PDS agents by the gram pradhans, head teachers and cooks as shown in Table-3.2.

3.3 Timely Release of Funds:

It was found that timely release of funds was done regularly in only 67.50 percent sample schools of districts. Period of delay in releasing of funds was found from one to six months, as shown in Table-3.3. It was also observed during social audit that E-transfer was the mode of payment for the cooking cost in all schools. The list of sample schools where release of funds and delayed of period in the schools is given in Annexure 2 (a) and 2 (b).

3.4 Availability of Cooks Cum-Helpers:

It was found that in all sample schools, MDM was being served by the appointed cook-cum-helpers. In all the sample schools the number of cooks was sufficient as per GOI norms. The cooks were appointed by the "CCH Selection Committee" and it was also observed that any CCHs were not appointed on the basis of waiting list in any of the



schools. Regular payments of honorarium to the CCHs were found in only 9 out of 40 sample schools. The name of sample schools where irregular payment of honorarium to CCHs is done is given in Annexure 3 (a) and 3 (b).

3.5 Regularity in Serving Meal:

It was found that in all sample schools, hot, cooked meal was provided to the students on a daily basis. Regularity in supplying hot cooked meal to the students in these schools has been observed by enquiring from the students, teachers and parents as well as MDM registers were also verified. It is reflected from the Table 3.5, during the last three months (April, May and July 2015) number of days, food was not served to the students. Food was according to menu in 82.50 percent schools. The list of sample schools where reasons for not serving MDM during last three months and food was not according to menu, is given in Annexure 4 (a) and 4 (b).

3.6 Quality and Quantity of Meals:

The quality and quantity of MDM were examined and it was found that in 67.50 percent schools the quality of meal was good while in the 30 percent schools it was found to be on an average. It was found that quality of meal was bad in one school of Shrawasti district. It was found that 82.50 percent selected schools were providing the prescribed quantity of mid day meal to students (Table 3.6). However, teachers and cooks of some schools have also reported that food was also supplied to few younger brothers and sisters of students, who were enrolled in ICDS centers running in same schools campus. This affected the sufficiency of food quantity in some of the schools. The list of sample schools, where bad quality and inadequate quantity of food and students were not satisfied with food is, given in Annexure 5 (a) and 5 (b).

3.7 Display of Information:

It is found that daily menu is shown at the right place in all the sample schools in Barabanki, but weekly menu is not displayed in 3 sample schools of Shrawasti district. Contact numbers of MDM officials and MDM Toll Free number display in 20 percent and 5 percent sample schools respectively. Display of MDM Logo was found in only 2 sample schools of Barabanki district (Table 3.7). 3.8 Enrollment, Attendance and Number of Students Taking Food in District Barabanki:

Table 3.8 (a) outlines school-wise, enrolment and attendance and a number of students taking MDM in the sample schools of Barabanki district. The data is on the basis of the day of social audit. On the day of visit, overall 59.27 percent students were present out of total 2696 enrolled students' .More than 97 percent present students taken the MDM on the day of social audit. The attendance of the cooks cum helpers' presence was also 100 percent on the day of social audit.

3.9 Enrollment, Attendance and Number of Students Taking Food in District Shrawasti:

3.12 Availability of Resources in the Schools:

Table 3.10 shows that 85 percent sample schools have potable water in convergence with drinking water in both districts. Pucca kitchen shed was observed in 80 percent and store rooms were available in 67.50 percent sample schools. During the social audit it was also found that Ceasefire was available in 90 percent schools of



Shrawasti and 70 percent sample schools of Barabanki districts. Kitchen devices also found available in 92.50 percent schools of both districts. Except these facilities, it was observed that covered drum for storage of food grains and plates for students were available in 15 percent schools and 12.50 percent sample schools respectively. Separate toilets for boys and girls were observed in 95 percent sample schools of each district. 3.14 Utility of Resources:

Table 3.12 shows that 100 percent sample schools have potable water in convergence with drinking water in both districts are usable. Pucca kitchen shed was utilized in 96.77 percent and store rooms were used in 55.55 percent sample schools. 3.16 Status of School Health Programme:

Issues regarding the child health care and related aspects were also examined in the districts. It was found that health cards were maintained in 65 percent schools. The frequency of health check-up was in current academic year 67.15 percent schools; As the Table 3.14 shows, all students of sample 72.50 percent schools were given micronutrients medicine periodically. Out of 40 schools, only 3 schools had the first aid medical kit.

Chapter IV

Impact of MDM Scheme

4.1 Impact of MDM Scheme:

As indicated in Table 4.1, community members, panchayat members and parents reported the impact of MDM in 92.50 percent sample schools with improved enrollment and attendance of students, enhancement of social harmony were reported during social audit in all the schools, increased hours of stay in school, students' improved health were found in 97.50 percent sample schools. It was found during social audit that in most of the sample schools of Shrawasti district have no records or data regarding income and expenditure of MDM scheme.

4.10 Dates, Venues and Participants of Public Hearings:

Public Hearings were conducted which were opened to all at the Block level as a culmination of the social audit process. In the public hearings, the school- wise social audit findings were read out in the presence of responsible educational officials for the taking up action to rectify a gap or laps in the proper implementation of MDM scheme and other participants like, parents, SMC members, Gram Pradhans, PDS agents, CCHs, Head Teachers of sample schools and media persons etc. were also presented. Issues about various interventions of MDM scheme were raised during public hearings and grievances were recorded. Instructions and directions were given to stockholders of MDM scheme by the Basic Shiskha Adhikaris (BSAs) during the public hearings. It was also found that memos / notices were also issued by Block Education Officers (BEOs) with the direction of BSAs to Head Teachers as well as Gram Pradhans and PDS agents who were found to have deviated the rules, GOs and guidelines regarding MDM scheme. During the Public Hearings in Shrawasti district Dr. Ram Chandra, Assistant Deputy Director, MDM Authority, U.P. was discussed with participants about the role and duties of Gram Pradhans, Head Teachers, PDS Agents and Cooks- Cum Helpers etc. Shri Rajesh Kumar Shahi, Assistant Deputy Director, MDM Authority, U.P. also replied on the various queries of Gram Pradhans, PDS Agents and CCHs during the Public Hearing at Bani Kodar block of Barabanki district. During the Public Hearing in Haidergarh block of Barabanki district on 20th January 2016, Dr. Ram Chandra, Assistant Deputy Director, MDM Authority, U.P. was also addressed to the participants about the new strategies of state government regarding MDM scheme. Details about the dates, venues and numbers of participants of Public Hearings are given in following Table 4.10.

4.11 Presentation of Findings' Social Audits of MDM Scheme with District Magistrate:

A meeting regarding major findings on social audits of MDM scheme in the office of district magistrate of Shrawasti was held on 26-08-2015 at 8:00 PM. B.S.A. Shrawsati, ADM Shrawsati, and B.E.Os of both sample blocks of Shrawasti district have also attended the meeting. Issues regarding important matters like, lack of cooking infrastructures in the schools, delay payment of honorarium and late supply of food grain etc. were discussed in the meeting and some critical problems of MDM programme in district were recorded by the DM. Instructions were given to BSA, ADM and Chief Development Officer (CDO) during the meeting for taking the necessary steps and to solve the problems for proper implementation of scheme.

4.12 Impact of Social Audit:

During the public hearings, the school- wise social audit findings were highlighted by social auditors/ resource persons in the presence of responsible educational officials. The officers made the quarries with concerned Head Teachers and Gram Pradhans regarding the issues like, the current status of records, wall writing regarding Toll Free Numbers, Menu, Logo of MDM Scheme, names of VECs / SMCs members and contact numbers of officers etc., which where was not found at the time of social audit. Most of the schools Head Teachers as well as Gram Pradhans have replied that these important interventions of the scheme were maintained after the social audit. These were not maintained in the schools during the social audit due to lack of knowledge.



Chapter V

Findings of Social Audit and Suggestions

5.1 Major Findings of Social Audit:

On the basis of above analysis, following major findings on Pilot Social Audit of MDM Scheme in Barabanki and Srawasti have emerged:

- For taking up Pilot Social Audit exercise of MDM Scheme, 20 schools were covered in each of sample districts Barabanki and Shrawasti. Out of 20 schools, 10 have been selected from each of the selected blocks of district.
- In each of the selected blocks, 6 primary and 4 upper primary total 10 schools belonging to different gram panchyats were selected randomly. Thus, total 40 sample schools were selected for pilot social audit of MDM scheme in Barabanki and Shrawasti districts.
- Briefing meetings were held before starting proposed activities under the Pilot Social Audit at BRCs in each sample block with the B.E.Os, ABRCs and all concerned Head Teachers including NPRCs of Shrawasti and Barabanki districts. In this meeting the preparation and strategies of Pilot Social Audit, location and type of schools including required information etc. were also discussed.
- Awareness campaigns were launched about the Pilot Social Audit on MDM Scheme through local media, wall writings and interact with stakeholders of the villages and education department including panchyats' representatives. The Social Auditors were identified by the resource persons from the parents of students studying in the schools and members of the SMCs who were willing for training and actively participating in the Social Audit process.
- One day training programme was organized in each of selected blocks by the resource persons for identifying Social Auditors residing in the selected Gram Panchayats.



- Focus Group Discussions (FGDs) were also held with parents, children, community, SMCs and panchayats' members etc. during the social audit regarding proper implementation of MDM Scheme and role and duties of stakeholder etc.
- The school level meetings were organized among the parents and the implementing agency (PDS agents, suppliers of food grains, panchyat representatives, CCHs, etc). The views of the students and parents were also solicited and recorded regarding various aspects of MDMS.
- Verification of MDM related all records at school level was undertaken which included SMCs meeting, food grain supply, income and expenditures of cooking cost, payment of honorarium to Cook-cum-helper and monitoring & supervision of the scheme etc.
- In Barabanki district out of 2193 PS and 912 UPS, 3 primary schools and 3 upper primary schools were without kitchen sheds. Whereas, in Shrawasti district all primary schools had kitchen sheds and about 4 percent upper primary schools had no kitchen sheds.
- Majority of cook- cum helpers belonged to OBC in both districts. Total of 1353 SC and 6521 OBC including general and minorities' cook- cum helpers are found in elementary schools of Barabanki district. In Shrawasti district the number of cook- cum helpers belonged to SC 310, OBC 1541, and minority 37 and to general caste 562 in primary schools. In upper primary schools there were 269 of SC, 329 of OBC, 14 of minority and 286 of general caste cook- cum helpers.
- At the time of Social Audit it was revealed that officials inspected only 84 percent schools in Barabanki district. However, all the schools were inspected by the officials in Shrawasti district. Inspection reports were discussed in the meeting of steering cum monitoring committee and action was also taken on these reports in both districts.
- District authority of MDM Scheme informed that contact numbers of fire fighting system and medical officers are displayed and first aid box is also available at every school of Barabanki district. Where as in Shrawasti district, fire fighting



system is available and contact numbers of district level officials and ambulance (108 &102) are displayed at every school.

- As reported by the district officials, this scheme has accelerated enrolment, attendance of students, and stay of students during the school timing, social harmony and nutritional status of students in both districts.
- In Barabanki district, an amount of Rs. 16.02 lakhs was received as honorarium of CCHs and 219.44 lakhs as conversion cost during the year 2015-16. All the money was spent on both heads with nil balance. In Shrawasti, district received Rs. 66.96 lakhs as honorarium of CCHs and Rs. 125.01 lakhs as conversion cost during the same year. Out of this nothing was spent as honorarium of CCHs whereas Rs. 60.60 lakhs (48.48 percent) were spent as conversion cost with a balance of Rs. 64.40 lakhs (51.52 percent) amount in Shrawasti district.
- Total 3420.38 quintal of wheat and 6946.56 quintal of rice was received in Barabanki district. All received food grains were consumed with nil balance. While total 1857.410 quintal wheat and 3774.90 quintal rice was received in Shrawasti district. Out of this, 572.140 quintal (30.80 percent) of wheat and 1144.280 quintal (30.31 percent) of rice was consumed. About 69 percent of both the cereals left as balance.
- It was found that food grain was supplied by PDS agent in 80 percent schools of Barabanki and 75 percent schools of Shrawasti districts. In rest of the schools, the supply of the foodgrains was ensured either by the gram pradhan or the school teachers. It is observed that good quality of food grains is available in 70 percent schools of Barabanki and 85 percent schools of Shrawasti District. It was also found that timely release of funds was only in 67.50 percent sample schools of districts.
- > During the social audit it was reported by the head teachers of 4 sample schools of Barabanki district and 5 schools of Shrawasti district that food grains was not accessed by PDS agents at schools level.
- It was observed that food grains were not directly accessed by PDS agents in the schools. The food grains were taken from PDS agents by the gram pradhans, head teachers and cooks.



- In all the sample schools the number of cooks was sufficient as per GOI norms. The cooks were appointed by the "CCH Selection Committee" and it was also observed that none of the waitlisted CCHs was appointed in any school.
- It was found that in all sample schools, hot cooked meal was provided to the students on a daily basis. Regularity in supplying hot cooked meal to the students in these schools is observed by enquiring from the students, teachers and parents as well as MDM registers were also verified.
- It was observed that in most of the schools the quality of meal was good while in some schools it was found to be average.
- Teachers and cooks of some schools have also reported that food was also supplied to few younger brothers and sisters of students, who were enrolled in ICDS centers running in same schools campus. This affected the sufficiency of food quantity in some of the schools.
- It is found that daily menu is shown at the right place in all the sample schools in Barabanki, but weekly menu is not displayed in 3 sample schools of Shrawasti district. Contact numbers of MDM officials and MDM. Toll Free number are displayed in 20 percent and 5 percent sample schools respectively. Display of MDM logo was found in only 2 sample schools of Barabanki district.
- On the day of visit, overall 59.27 percent students were present out of total 2696 enrolled students' in Barabanki district. More than 97 percent present students taken the MDM on the day of social audit. While in district of Srawasti, overall 47.66 percent students were present out of the total 2411 enrolled students. 99.56 percent students of total present students had taken the MDM on the day of social audit.
- Pucca kitchen sheds were observed in 77.50 percent and store rooms were available in 67.50 percent sample schools. During the social audit it was also found that ceasefire was available in 90 percent schools of Shrawasti and 70 percent sample schools of Barabanki districts. Kitchen devices were also found available in 92.50 percent schools of both districts.



- Queue was observed for serving and seating arrangement for eating of food in 87.50 percent sample schools of both districts. It is observed that no any of the sample school has caste or community discrimination in cooking and serving or seating arrangement was observed in each of the district.
- It was found that health cards were maintained in 65 percent schools. The frequency of health check-up was in current academic year 67.15 percent schools in allotted districts.
- It was also revealed during the social audit that security and sanitation conditions were good or satisfactory in 97.50 percent and 80 percent sample schools respectively. The students washed their hands before and after eating in all the sample schools.
- It was found during social audit that community of sample villages are mostly uneducated and have no awareness about sanitation and proper maintenance of the schools premises. The people do not donate for creation of infrastructure for MDM scheme of the schools like plates, glasses, drums for storage of food grains and hand pumps etc. The members also do not taking interest for participation formally in SMC meetings in sample schools. However, they are found to be involved in the supervision of MDM distribution in the schools.
- Before the meal was served to students it was tasted by the teachers, VSS and Parents. It was found that MDM was tasted daily by teachers of 90 percent schools. It was found that in 85 percent sample schools tasted by CCHs and parents & SMC members in 40 percent schools.
- 65 percent parents and SMC members of schools supervised MDM on a daily basis and found it to be satisfactory. In case of VECs, 67.50 percent supervised MDM in schools. 17 Meetings of SMCs in current academic session were organized till the date of social audit. MDM related discussions were held in 65 percent SMC meeting.
- As an outcome of MDM Scheme, 92.50 percent sample schools have improved enrollment and attendance of students, enhancement of social harmony was reported during social audit in all the schools, increased hours of stay in school, students' improved health were found in 97.50 percent sample schools.



- It was also observed during the social audit availability of toll free number was found in only one school of each district. Most of the sample schools of Barabanki district have required records for the implementation of MDM scheme and its maintenance was also in good or satisfactory conditions.
- It was found during social audit that in most of the sample schools of Shrawasti district have no records or data regarding income and expenditure of grants under MDM scheme and four sample schools of Barabanki district also have no records regarding income and expenditure of grants.
- None of the Gram Pradhans maintain account of food grains received from PDS Agents. The Social Auditors could not ascertain from schools about the stock position as it is not maintained in the maximum schools.
- It was found during social audit that six sample schools of Barabanki district have no records regarding receiving and consumption of food grains and in Shrawasti district out of 20, nine sample schools have no records regarding receiving and consumption of food grains.
- It was observed during social audit serving utensils (plates) have neither being procured by the schools nor donated by the community except one or two schools in both districts. As a result children bring plates from home. Generally they bring a small plate and meals served only one time in some of the schools which is insufficient to hold meals as per norms.
- It was found during social audit that drinking water is available through only local hand pumps which are unhygienic. It was also observed that in a campus where both primary and upper primary schools are, only one hand pump was found which is insufficient for hand wash and drinking for students. Toilets of sample schools are mostly non-functional. They are locked and garbage dumps surrounding its and there is no water supply also.
- The safety and security of the sample schools is a concern. Cooking devices, pots, LPG cylinders and food grains are stolen frequently. The schools authority has to sift the valuable items after closing of school in both districts especially in Shrawasti district has a major problem of theft.



- In course of social audit the availability, maintenance and updation status of Parents Teachers Association (PTA) and Mothers Teachers Association (MTA) records was verified in the sample schools. It is observed that 50 percent sample schools in Barabanki district and 85 percent in Shrawasti district have records of PTA /MTA and their maintenance was found in good or satisfactory conditions. PTA and MTA records were not found updated in most of the schools.
- Issues about various interventions of MDM scheme were raised during public hearings and grievances were recorded. Instructions and directions were given to stakeholders of MDM scheme by the Zila Basic Shiskha Adhikaris (BSAs) during the public hearings. It was also found that memos / notices were also issued by Block Education Officers (BEOs) with the direction of BSAs to Head Teachers as well as Gram Pradhans and PDS agents who were found to have deviated the rules, GOs and guidelines regarding MDM scheme.

5.2 Suggestions:

On the basis of Pilot Social Audits and discussion with different stakeholders of the MDM scheme, in sample districts, the followings are the suggestions and recommendations for better implementation of the MDM programme in the State.

- As the scheme is found to be good for improving the enrollment, attendance status of students in the districts, it is suggested that trainings under MDM scheme should be given to all head teachers and gram pradhans under management, supervision, record keeping and accounting system.
- It was observed that it needs training for record keeping which was found to be a weak link in the entire delivery mechanism of the mid-day meal scheme in the districts. It was also found that the cooks need to be trained on hygiene, safety and security.
- * Keeping in view the volume of works and responsibilities under the MDM scheme at school level, it is suggested that at least one male supervisor should be appointed for doing arrangement of cooking materials, fuels, vegetables and transportation of food grains etc.
- ❖ It was observed in course of social audit that guidelines regarding MDM scheme did not find any sample school in both districts. Therefore, it is suggested that guidelines regarding MDM scheme should be provided to each school as well as gram pradhans.



- ❖ It needs to take very strict action against the head teachers, CCHs, officials of all levels and gram pradhans who violate the Guidelines.
- During the Social Audit of Mid-Day Meals Scheme, the stakeholders have reported and it was also observed that none of the schools has reported about the grievances redressal mechanism and very few schools displayed contact numbers of responsible officials in both districts. It was also observed during the social audit availability of toll free number was found in only one school of each district. Therefore, it is suggested that district authorities should be ensured the display of MDM toll free number and contact numbers of officials in premises of all schools.
- On the basis of discussion with parents, CCHs, teachers, officials' panchyats representatives as well as progressive SMC members, it is recommended that the gas cylinders should be provided to all of the schools for safe cooking the meals for students.
- A review of the guidelines of the Mid-Day Meals Scheme viewed that a proper strategy for its implementation was developed but it is required that monitoring and supervision part should be more effective at district and block level. It was observed during the process of social audits that District Coordinators (MDM) of both districts was found irresponsible towards MDM scheme as well as Social Audit process. They were not attended any Public Hearing too. In the public hearings, the school- wise social audit findings were read out in the presence of responsible educational officials for taking up action to rectify a gap or laps in the proper implementation of MDM scheme.
- ❖ In the absence of adequate monitoring and supervision mechanism in some of the sample schools, implementation could not be monitored properly. It is further suggested that the accountability of the MDM Coordinators should be ensured for the implementation of the MDM Scheme.
- ❖ It was discussed by community and other stakeholders of scheme that there is practically no inspection or visits was done by the district level authorities on availability and status of food grain. A regular inspection should be taken place by the Block Education Officers disruption should not be avoided.
- ❖ It is also reported by head teachers, CCHs and gram pradhans in some of the sample schools that required conversion cost and food grains regarding the scheme is not made available on time to the schools by the district authorities. As



result, implementation of MDM scheme is adversely effected. Hence, it is suggested that the district should be provided conversion cost and food grains on time.

- ❖ It was observed that the gram pradhans are not able to maintain any records of the food grains received and there is a gap between the records of the food grains supplied by the PDS Agents and received/utilized by the school. It recommends that the records of food grains should be maintained at all levels through which it passes by the implementing agencies and gram pradhans.
- It is found during the interaction with the stakeholders of MDM scheme that many times food grains have destroyed or ineffective due to food grains kept in the jute bags and natural calamities like, flood and heavy rain, etc. As result, MDM has not served to the students. In view of this, it is recommended that the covered drums should be provided to all of the schools for safety of food grains.
- Food grain at any cost should be placed under the custody of Head Teachers and SMC president whenever they are implementing agency. Sufficient storage should be provided in schools to store the grains.
- During the Social Audit of Mid Day Meal Scheme, the stakeholders have reported that sometimes the supply of food grains provided under the scheme has been low quality. It is suggested that supply of food grains under the scheme should be checked thoroughly.
- ❖ Gram Pradhans and teachers of sample schools complaint regarding less quantity of food grains delivered by PDS Agents. It needs to more stringent monitoring mechanism to ensure that food grains are lifted by PDS Agents as the same.
- ❖ It is observed during the Social Audits and interaction with the stakeholders of MDM scheme that many times students go to home in lunch hours for taking the plates to eat MDM. As result, most of them do not return to school due to household works. In view of this, it is recommended that the steel plates and glasses for water should be provided to all students. Sufficient funds are available under MME for this purpose; in some cases school grant released under SSA may be utilized for purchasing of plates and glasses.
- ❖ It is found during the Social Audits and interaction with the students as well as CCHs of sample schools that sometimes students and CCHs suffered from burn during cooking or taking the hot meals in the schools. Therefore, it is recommended that the First Aid Box should be provided to all the schools.
- The Mid Day Meal is together implemented by the Head Teachers and Village Pradhans of the panchayats. They are the custodians of the MDM food grains and



conversion cost. It was found during social Audits in both allotted districts that some Village Pradhans are not supplying food grains properly from the stock held by them which led to huge disruptions in serving of MDM. Therefore, it is very necessary that someone else should take responsibility with the gram pradhans.

- As the Pradhans are too busy with other development schemes and many women Pradhans expressed their inability to implement the scheme, hence it is recommended that the School Management Committees (SMCs) may be strengthened. Village Education Committees can be the supervising bodies and the SMCs can be engaged to implement MDM Scheme. The food grains may also be placed under the custody of SMC Presidents of the schools.
- The MDM account may also be opened jointly by the SMC Presidents and Head Teachers like other SSA account. Involving SMCs should lead to improve the quality, serving status of MDM and community participation etc.
- The CCHs informed during the social audits that they are paid very late and mere honorarium which is not sufficient enough. So it is recommended that keeping in view to inflations, honorarium of CCHs should pay some more.
- Frequent stealing of schools' property like gas cylinders, utensils food grains have been reported; hence firm action may be taken to ensure security of school infrastructures through the involvement of local community, SMCs and panchayat etc.
- All assets / infrastructures under the MDM scheme should be recorded in the maintained stock register in each of the school.
- ❖ On the basis of finding of the impact assessment of MDM scheme, it is proved that MDM scheme has been successfully achieving its objectives like enrollment, attendance, stay in school hours, social harmony and nutrition of student are increased in districts however, it needs to include Secondary school opened under Rastriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan (RMSA) as well as Maqtab Madarsa in the State.
- Pilot Social Audit of the Mid- Day Meal Scheme is found to be very essential and fruitful for enhancement of community participation. It needs to conduct Social Audits in all schools of the State by an independent agency.
